
What To Bring

Instructions for Getting There

Sue and Kim's home is 3.29 kilometres from Pauatahanui village, heading north up the Paekakariki Hill Rd. At the end of a long straight you'll find the golf club on the right. Turn left into the drive just past that, cross the bridge and take the left hand fork to the house.

The nearest train stations are Paramata and Plimmerton if you are being picked up by a driver. Cell phone coverage is marginal but if you have any problems finding it, phone landline 2379029.

7. Review, 'A Touch of the Blues' with Cindy Muggeridge, Roseneath Hall, 26 November

First up was John Sutherland, direct to us from Aberdeen, via a fair few smoky dives and lonesome train tracks. His assured set was accompanied by Jenny Kilpatrick on bass. Highlights were the Viagra song *I'll be up some day* and *Train 'n gone* by Ralph McTell with some excellent whistling (got to love a man who whistles), and *You bring out the boogie in me*.

Blakewater Blues are Gordon Chamley and Murray Kilpatrick, again showing that effortless musicality and ease with an audience gained from years of practice. Their rootsie blues went down a treat, especially *Winin' Boy* and *Nobody's blues but mine.*

In the second half Cindy Muggeridge led an exuberant dance to the end of the evening, sometimes skipping, at other times a slinky strut. Cindy Muggeridge, Marian Carter and Neil Billington are a charmingly slick act, performing Cindy's own funny and thoughtful songs and some spirited covers. The excellent *Keep a coming round* has the well-earned prospect of a recording in its future. Marion's clarinet and

vocal accompaniment was moody and rich, and as always Neil Billington on harmonica was all class. Standouts were the sublime *Cry me a river*, and *Wild women don't get the blues*, ending up with the flirty naughty *Don't you feel my leg.* These are generous, relaxed and musically top notch performers, warmly received by the audience on an evening where outside it was blowing like billy-o.

The concert was watched over by a fantastic portrait of John Lee Hooker by Susan Dixon and ably compered by Pamela Gerrish Nunn. Sound by Murray and Barry who also assisted on drums.

8. Notes from the Wee Marquee

As one of the sound crew, I spent much of this year's Wellyfest in the small marquee, so in a way I saw a festival within the festival and was able to focus on the offerings in just one of the half dozen performance venues. With so much going on at the festival at any one time, the performers in the wee tent played to smallish audiences at times, which was a pity considering some of the fine things happening there. What we got was a fascinating microcosm of the festival, with a mixture of concerts, workshops and other participatory events.

Veteran local singer songwriter, Rob Joass, broke the ice with the opening concert there on Saturday morning and was able to warm up the tent by attracting curious passersby, many of whom liked what they heard and stayed for the rest of his set. For Ewan MacColl fans, it was the only place to be, later that morning, when Paul Brown led a nicely put together tribute to the life and songs of MacColl, with the help of a bunch of performers who gave us the songs to illustrate the story.

As well as looking back, there was a strong emphasis on looking forward at that venue too, with a Saturday afternoon concert featuring young singers starting to make their mark - Albi from Auckland doing a solo set and Wellington singers Keely Turuwhenua and Michael Muggeridge. Michael was back later that afternoon as part of the super talented Muggeridge family, who gave us a dynamic and heart-warming set, mostly of Muggeridge originals.

We got to see more of the emerging local talent on Sunday, too, with the final of the Joan Prior Young Performers Award, won by guitarist and composer Daniel White. Seeing all that, and the enthusiasm and some seriously good playing in the children's concert on Sunday, left me in no doubt that the music's in good hands.

Add in the illuminating discussion at the song-writers' forum in Sunday and the festival choir sessions and you have to say that the wee marquee was a pretty good place to hang out at Wellyfest.

12. About Acoustic Routes

Acoustic Routes (Wellington Folk Centre Incorporated) is a club for people who enjoy playing and listening to folk and acoustic styles of music.

We have several regular events each month. The first Sunday of the month is an open mic session at the Thunderbird Café in Featherston Street, from 1-3 pm.

The second Sunday of the month we host a singaround at Alfred Memmelink's Artspace on the Petone foreshore, from 5-7 pm.

The fourth Thursday of the month generally features a concert, usually with a visiting artist and support acts from amongst our membership. These concerts are at Roseneath School Hall, Maida Vale Road, Wellington.

Membership of Acoustic Routes costs \$25 a year for individuals, \$40 for couples or families, or \$15 for students and beneficiaries. It entitles you to door-charge discounts at Acoustic Routes events and also at events put on by most other folk clubs.
