To enrich the second half of the evening we have a bit of the real thing with esteemed local musician Pat Higgins as our guest.


Those who attended our recent Scottish night can look forward to enjoying again the special pleasure of sharing music amongst friends, while those who missed that occasion have a chance to make amends.

2. Claire Hastings house concert, Dave and Jan Barnes' home, 4 Rangatira Road Tawa, Thursday 14 April, 7:30 pm

An intimate evening of traditional music from Claire Hastings, one of the bright new stars of the British folk scene. She is a folksinger/songwriter and player of guitar and ukelele originally from Dumfries, who in 2015 won the prestigious BBC Radio Scotland's Young Traditional Musician of the Year award.



After graduating with a first class honours degree in Scottish Music from the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland in 2011, Claire spent 18 months travelling the world with her ukulele, but is now living in Glasgow. This will be her first solo tour of Aotearoa/New Zealand. Last year Claire's performances included the BBC Proms in the Park with the Scottish Symphony Orchestra and BBC Music Day, singing for the First Minister Nicola Sturgeon in London's National Theatre, at Orkney Folk Festival, at the Scottish Parliament in Edinburgh and in the 4 star-reviewed show 'A Man's a Man' at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival.

April will see the release of her debut album, Between River and Railway.

Kia ora katoa – Hello everyone:

One of the things I enjoyed most at the delightful concert that Himmerland gave us on the 20th was the sound of different languages in the air – I noticed three – and that's an experience reinforced by the various festivals that bring in performers and artists from overseas for our enjoyment here. It's something we have generally available in the Wellington area to a greater degree than may be obvious, however, and it's a dimension the club might consider pursuing in the future, if the requisite energy can be harnessed.

We'll be hearing the Māori language at our July concert of the group Wai Tai but, going further than Te Reo, I know of specific groups of musicians locally performing in the Italian folk tradition and making music from combined Chinese and Kiwi roots – and there is, of course, the well-known combo the Balkanistas (whom we have approached in the past but who cost quite a bit, being so numerous...) – and you may well know of other national or ethnic music being played in and around the city. Although it's perhaps inevitable that the musical traditions of what each of us thinks of as our own inheritance would interest us most, there is a huge range of folk music out there that speaks of tradition, social history and human experience in accessible and enlightening ways.

This month, meanwhile, we are hosting a fine young exponent of Scottish and other British music, Claire Hastings, and one of the best of our own, Mike Harding. And don't forget our upcoming invitation to make your own music – in your very own language – in the Blind Date concert. Allez-y, alors! as they say in a certain other country...

7. Review, Himmerland and Nuala Kennedy concert, Roseneath School Hall, 20 March

Perhaps Danish reggae and African drumming mixed with Gaelic traddy singing in a fusion of Jazz, together with a thumping DADGAD guitar, may not be your thing. Add a soprano sax playing jigs, and many old folkies (like me) would go running for the hills rather than venturing to such a concert. Luckily I didn't fancy the heather that evening, and I was there. But for the many of you who hung out with the lambs, you missed a treat. Ethnic-blended sounds (WOMAD style) has never really appealed to me because it's often a wall of noise and too loud. But the sound was perfect in this concert, each instrument clear and precise – a tribute to the musicians and also Murray Kilpatrick on the sound desk.

The dancing drummer, Ayi Solomon from Ghana, was a genius at holding the complex rhythms together and leading the band. His energetic solos on the stand-up drums were a sight to be seen, and all achieved on only three skins. The sax player, Eskil Romme, and guitar player, Sigurd Hockings, are both from Denmark. They have visited NZ many times in different musical-masks. Music just pours out of their ears and into the air somehow, with very little effort. I'm so jealous of their dexterity I just want to break their fingers. The guitar blended perfectly with the singing and I can't believe how beautiful the sax is, as a delicate folk instrument (who would have thought).

Nuala Kennedy's (from Ireland) voice is everything I enjoy in traddy singing and the main reason I was there. She has a unique Irish north/east way of singing and was a high-light of the evening. "We've gone electric", she announced, before playing wonderful Cape Breton tunes on the Irish flute. It all worked so well, but I did wish the drums would rest occasionally and not force rhythm into some of the slower pieces. The sound mix put her in front of the instruments, which is very important but not understood often. Oh, and boy, can she play the various size whistles. It just makes me madder with finger-breaking envy.

10. About Acoustic Routes

Acoustic Routes (Wellington Folk Centre Incorporated) is a club for people who enjoy playing and listening to folk and acoustic styles of music.

We have several regular events each month. The second Sunday of the month we host a singaround at Alfred Memmelink's Artspace on the Petone foreshore, from 5-7 pm.

The fourth Thursday of the month generally features a concert, usually with a visiting artist and support acts from amongst our membership. These concerts are at Roseneath School Hall, Maida Vale Road, Wellington.

Membership of Acoustic Routes costs \$25 a year for individuals, \$40 for couples or families, or \$15 for students and beneficiaries. It entitles you to door-charge discounts at Acoustic Routes events and also at events put on by most other folk clubs.
