
then. You can bank on a touch of bluegrass, a dollop of folk, a dash of blues, and who knows what else...

Review, Mike Harding Concert, 28 April 5.

We had a good turnout on April's regular club night to hear Mike Harding, with supporting spots from Deb Harding (accompanied by Mike, Lisa and Jude Douglas) and from Toil & Trouble (Ron Craig, Jude Douglas and Mary Hubble).

After a few microphone issues, Deb & crew decided to go acoustic and proceeded to sing the very poignant Pinjarra Dreams, from Chris While & Julie Matthews Ballads of Child Migration. Deb and Lisa's beautifully blended harmonies were given very sensitive accompaniment by Mike on guitar and Jude on fiddle. This was followed by Moon Cradle (Loreena McKennitt), also very easy on the ear, and, with a little extra help (as well as an audience which needed no prompting to join in) a very satisfying rendition of Bread and Roses, with some very slight variations on the lyrics I have known, but for the better in my opinion.

Deb & friends were followed by one of Wellington's many pop-up groups, which is not to suggest that they're ephemeral, more that new combinations are always being formed. This group - Toil & Trouble - consists of Ron Craig (guitar & vocals), Jude Douglas (fiddle & vocals) and Mary Hubble (vocals, flute and bionic hip), quality ingredients for a good brew and they certainly delivered. We were treated to a mixture of songs and tunes, giving all three a chance to take centre stage. Ron led off with Hidden love (Peter Case), also taking the lead later on Dick Gaughan's very moving Different Kind of Love Song and on The Loneliest (Stuart Abbott, John

McCusker & Heidi Talbot). Jude & Mary featured their instruments on John McCusker's *Anne McGuire's Silver Wedding* and *Emma & Jamie's Wedding*, and Mary took the lead on (an old favourite of mine) *The Shores of Old Blighty* (Graham Miles). I was torn between basking in the lovely harmonies and joining in on that one (surprise – I joined in). Once again the combination of lovely voices, sensitive accompaniment and good material made for very enjoyable listening.

And what can I say about Mike? We were treated to a combination of oldies – starting with *Eketahuna*, which got everyone joining in and bringing out their smiling selves, set to enjoy what was to come – and less familiar (to me anyway) numbers such as Mike's own evocative songs *South West* and *West* (the Coast). Ideas like "a piece of the mountains in every grain of sand" and "winding back the sun" really pull you into the songs.



Mike's voice handles with ease the humourous (a 1930s Victoria Tramping Club song about double bunking, and a song about an unfortunate Stratford policewoman who stranded her car on railway tracks while in pursuit of a malefactor) to the serious (*Down in the Brunner Mine, Alexander Whisker's Song* – this latter set by Bev Young) to the poignant *Old Flames* (Harding) and Wayne Gillespies's *Invercargill*.

The songs took us all over the country from up north (*Alexander Whisker's Song*) via Pakuranga (Kath Tait's *Poor Dim Sally*), the *Banks of the Waikato* (Phil Garland), Eketahuna, Stratford, *Paekakariki* (Ken Avery), Wellington (*Coffee Bar Blues* by Peter Cape), West Coast, Arrowtown (*Ghosts of Arrowtown* – a Dennis Hogan poem set to music by Read Hudson), to Te Anau, Invercargill and anywhere in between (Phil Powers' *Denim Blues* and David McKee-Wright's *While the Billy Boils*). Truly a feast of New Zealand history and music, with every course a treat, delivered in Mike's rich voice with just the right level of accompaniment to compliment the songs, and with a warmth and lightness of touch which made for a very smiley drive home.

6. Review, Other Roads Concert, 12 May

To say that the weather was inclement last Thursday would be an understatement – it was wild - and the brave who ventured out to the Other Roads concert were treated to an evening of excellent music.

The evening opened with **Helen Dorothy** presenting a lovely set of songs, mostly about the natural world, as observed and written about in her charming style. Who would have thought it possible to sing about a giant squid with sympathy and beautiful atmospheric guitar? It was good to hear songs from her new cd but also to meet again some old friends like "The Eucalyptus Man". Helen uses her voice and guitar to great effect and her disarming manner on stage ensures her audience of a rewarding experience.

Then **Other Roads** took the stage and gave us another reward for making the effort to get to Roseneath. The group is blessed with a range of voices which provide rich and warm harmonies as well as accomplished musicianship on guitar, mandolin, bouzouki and particularly fiddle on the part of Gregor Borland. His skill on that instrument was manifest in the beautiful solo "Island Trio" and in his sympathetic treatment when accompanying songs.



Their song writing is assured and imaginative, apart from the self-confessed lack of wit with regard to titles, which was an ongoing joke. My particular favourite was "Rosemary's Garden" and Dave Walmisley especially proved adept at being able to write songs to move the listener. Other Roads are great entertainers and their stage manner and easy involvement of their audience makes them firm favourites. An evening with them is one well spent.

7. Review, Springtide Concert, 26 May

Springtide and more -

Last Thursday night, Roseneath school hall was festooned with a truly wonderful array of instruments and performers. A feast of music awaited us. I have it on good authority from a regular that the audience was a great turnout. (Thanks, Robin)

First up was **AGM** or **Awesome Gurdy Machine**a quintet of three on hurdy gurdies with Dominic Rowsell, Merrilyn Moonen and Philippa Boy joined by Liz Merton on percussion and Tim Barrie on Oud. We were treated to unique sounds and music evoking far off countries and times. Included in the set was French, Turkish and Spanish sephardic music. One piece in particular was played at breathtaking speed, the three gurdies keeping amazing time together. Probably the highlight for me was an exquisite taxim that Tim and Liz started, with the gurdies then joining in echoing the oud. Throughout the performance Liz was full of fun, energy and expert drumming leaving the gurdy players free to power up their gurdies and go for it. Nice to see Dominic, a younger supporter of Acoustic Routes, performing on stage.

Then in wonderful contrast, singer/songwriter **Nigel Parry** performed New Zealand songs, some of them originals. His delivery of words, voice and guitar was beautifully crafted. Amongst the songs written by Nigel "Nine pairs of eyes", a personal favourite of mine, records the history of the whaling family the Peranos. He was lucky enough to meet the members of the Perano family on his recent tour of the South Island.

A tea break in which to chat then on to the main act, **Springtide**, a trio from Australia who come to us on their tour of the North Island. We were so lucky to have the opportunity to hear them. Hammered dulcimer player Jackie Luke grew up in the Waikato. She was joined by Greg Wilson on Celtic harp & accordions and

innovative cellist Rita Woolhouse. They produced a repertoire that featured Celtic classics (e.g. O'Carolan, Dougie McLean) interwoven with music from around the world. They also write their own tunes, and Jackie's songs reflect her Kiwi heritage. One in particular that stood out for me was about the tragic 1863 Orpheus shipwreck in the Manukau Harbour. It was written from the point of view of the figurehead on the prow of the ship. Jackie's words were original, well-chosen and poignant with a family connection adding extra depth and meaning. The three Springtide performers are masters on their instruments, each taking their turn to wow us. There was humour and toe-tapping, beauty and tragedy. We were even treated to a song from Lord of the Rings.

If you missed the night, I hope this tells you something of what was and is the wonderful welcoming box of chocolates that is Acoustic Routes. If you were there, then I am sure you have your own delightful memories of the evening.

f) Re-Release of the Album 'Down a Country Road'

Kiwi-Pacific Records will be releasing the newly digitised album of 'Down A Country Road' at the Folk Under The Mountain Folk Festival this coming May. Two of the original backing musicians are no longer with us, having passed on in recent times. This album serves as a tribute to the huge musical talent of the late great Alistair Hulett, still a teenager in1970, who is featured here playing concertina and penny whistle along with the late wonderful musician and friend Dave Hart, who not only played on the early recording, but also added some more of his musical expertise to further enhance the songs again in 2013.

Since the album's initial release in 1971, a couple of songs developed a life of their own - 'Smoko' winning best new bush song for the Australian Bush Band 'Leaping Lizards' in the 1980s, while 'Farewell To The Grey' can be regularly heard as part of the West Coast Goldfields media presentation at the Hokitika Museum. Although half of the tracks have been preserved as originally recorded, the remainder have been enhanced by the addition of some further sympathetic accompaniment. The newly digitised CD also features two new tracks, which were recorded around the same time frame helping to give the album a more rounded presentation of our Kiwi folk music heritage.

Acoustic Routes (Wellington Folk Centre Incorporated) is a club for people who enjoy playing and listening to folk and acoustic styles of music.

Membership of Acoustic Routes costs \$25 a year for individuals, \$40 for couples or families, or \$15 for students and beneficiaries. It entitles you to door-charge discounts at Acoustic Routes events and also at events put on by most other folk clubs.
