1. Young Folk concert, Roseneath School Hall, Thursday 25 August, 7:30 pm



The Riverslea Retreat is an annual highlight of the Acoustic Routes calendar. A great opportunity to drive away the winter blues with warm company and wonderful music.



Located on the Otaki Gorge Road, Riverslea can accommodate up to 37 people, including people with disabilities and mobility problems. The lounge has a cosy log fire - a lovely room to play and socialize in. There is also a great kitchen and dining area.

Tea, coffee and milo are provided and there will be a shared meal on Saturday night. Pillow, pillow case and bottom sheet are provided on the bunks.

5. The 2016 Joan Prior Young Performers Award



The Joan Prior Young Performers Award, which Acoustic Routes initiated in 2014, will be running again this year.

Joan was an inspiration to generations of singers, musicians and dancers around Wellington from the late 1950s. Originally from northern England, she was dubbed 'The Johnsonville Songthrush', and had a huge repertoire of mainly British folksong. After she died in 2010 her family donated her collection of instruments, recordings and memorabilia to Acoustic Routes, and this enabled us to set up the award in her name.

The award is open to solo or duo performers aged from 15 to 25 years on August 1st 2016 and resident in the Wellington area, and offers a prize of \$500.

It will be run slightly differently in 2016. Instead of having two stages, with Acoustic Routes hosting an initial concert of entrants followed by the final at Wellington Folk Festival, this year the award will be a fully integrated part of the festival. There will be a single concert at the festival where the award entrants will perform, with a panel of judges selecting the winner. The aim is to simplify the award arrangements and to attract more entries, especially from the growing number of young performers who are attending the festival.

Full details, with conditions and entry form, will be posted on the Acoustic Routes and Wellington Folk Festival websites and associated Facebook pages shortly. In the meantime, you can help get the ball rolling by telling eligible young performers about the award and the very nice prize at stake.

6. Wellington Folk Festival 2016, 21-24 October

You'll be able to buy tickets and book bunks for the 2016 Festival very soon. Make sure you keep an eye on the website www.wellingtonfolkfestival.org.nz and the Facebook page: Wellyfest. There will be a limited number of bunks so make sure you get in quick. There will be new options for payment this year and earlybird prices. You'll also be able to prebook and prepay for day and evening tickets - makes it much easier at the gate and we will not have EFTPOS at the gate.

People's Choice competition opens soon too: Never had a paid gig at Wellyfest? now's your chance - just like Wellyfest Facebook Page get a video of your performance ready and watch out for the competition .

7. Review, Wai Tai concert, with support from The PJs and Chris Moses, 28 July

There's a key word to sum up this concert, and that's 'relevancy'. The offerings from all three acts were strong on songs about issues that are all too relevant in today's world. Chris Moses, who opened the night, is a local singer and guitarist who was a highlight of the AR open mic at the Thunderbird while it was running and is also a regular at the Plimmerton Yacht Club open mic nights. Chris has a powerful and percussive guitar style that drives his songs, commenting on the social problems that beset people, as well as issues such as colonialism. His set at this concert included a couple of more tender songs as well. Chris's guitar style and song writing have the same appeal for me as the mighty Paul Ubana Jones.

The PJs are Pamela Gerrish Nunn and Jenny Kilpatrick, who gave us a nicely chosen selection of songs, both traditional and contemporary. Instrumentation was limited to occasional bass or recorder accompaniment from Jenny. Singing is their forte. Their voices blend wonderfully well and the harmonies they produce are very fine indeed. Their other strength is their repertoire. Their songs, whether old or new, are pertinent and that's something the audience truly appreciated. Of particular note, for me, were Leon Rosselson's haunting commentary on the appalling Aberfan disaster "Palaces of Gold", Lynn Clark's anti-nuclear peace song, "Send the Boats Away", which I hadn't heard for ages, and one I especially enjoyed as a tree-hugger of old: "Branching Out", a song about the mystery and magic of trees.

It was the PJs' second last performance before Pam heads to the US to take up a visiting professorship at Memphis University. They were the main act at Pukerua Bay this week too. We wish Pam all the best for the next year.

To wrap up a very satisfying night, we had Wai Tai, a group which plays songs and tunes blending Maoritanga with folk traditions. The core of Wai Tai are Robyn Kamira, a singer, songwriter and guitarist (and banjo-ukelele player) who hails from the Far North and Krissie Jackson, a top-notch fiddler as well as singer from Taranaki, who we previously saw with the Frank Burkitt band at Acoustic Routes last year. Their line-up at this concert included Luther Hunt on percussion.

Wai Tai, which translates as 'Ocean Water', describe their music as 'contemporary waiata fused into world sounds' and that, I think, is an apt description. Their set included a tune with Irish-French origins, a Middle-eastern flavoured tune which combined Krissie's fiddle and Robyn's banjo-ukelele. But at the heart of their repertoire are songs in Te Reo, from contemporary as well as traditional sources. They included one with lyrics from Robyn's grandfather and three compositions from the masterly Hirini Melbourne, a teacher of both Robyn and Krissie, who made the promotion of Te Reo through music a mission in his life.

Wai Tai's weaving together of language and instruments was a joy and hearing their songs in Te Reo soon after Maori Language Week reinforced the relevancy of the night. I'm looking forward to seeing them again at Wellyfest this year.
