Campaign Statement

When I became President of Acoustic Routes, I signaled that I wanted to make changes to how our club runs. These are my own opinions and ideas and don't represent the views of the committee or anybody else. However, I was asked by a committee member to post these and with the AGM coming very soon, I felt that it was appropriate for me to do so, to promote further thought and discussion. I would welcome feedback. musicianmurray@gmail.com

- 1. First and foremost, I would like to build up community ownership of the club. I believe that this community is made up from people who like to play, sing, perform, and interact. I feel that we need to provide many more opportunities for each and every one of you to perform and interact musically and socially in a variety of different ways that meet your needs.
- 2. In my view, the club should aim to operate at least once a week, maybe even more frequently. It should offer a wide variety of activities that include, but are not restricted to, concerts, sing arounds, open mics, workshops, interest groups, jam sessions, dances, lessons, discussions, fun, ... To do this, I think we need a different venue, one that offers us greater space, time, location and financial flexibility.
- 3. The Club should involve a much wider age group, particularly a much younger club community. Young people can lead the way and provide succession for our club to future generations.

- 4. I would like Acoustic routes to be seen as the centre, a sort of umbrella under which different interest and activity groups within our folkie scene can freely interact and run the sort of events that they want, within or outside the main committee. I also think we should form closer links with all other musical and performance organisations.
- 5. Acoustic Routes needs a strong committee and group of helpers outside the committee to run a larger number of activities. The club needs your ideas, help and involvement.

7. The 2018 Joan Prior Young Performers Award



The Joan Prior Young Performers Award, which Acoustic Routes initiated in 2014, is back again after a year's break.

Joan was an inspiration to generations of singers, musicians and dancers around Wellington from the late 1950s. Originally from northern England, she was dubbed 'The Johnsonville Songthrush', and had a huge repertoire of mainly British folksong. After she died in 2010 her family donated her collection of instruments, recordings and memorabilia to Acoustic Routes, and this enabled us to set up the award in her name.

The award is open to solo or duo performers aged 15-25 years on 30 September 2018 and resident in the Wellington area, with a prize of \$500.

It is a fully integrated part of the Wellington Folk Festival. There will be a single concert at the festival where entrants will perform before a panel of judges who will select the winner. Full details, with conditions and entry form, will be posted on the Acoustic Routes website www.acousticroutes.org.nz. Also check wellingtonfolkfestival.org.nz and Facebook pages. **Applications close Friday 30 September.**

Please note: normal festival entry costs will apply. Either a full weekend or relevant day pass will need to be purchased by entrants and anyone else attending.

8. Review, Pat Higgins alternative guitar tunings workshop, 22 July

Pat Higgins very generously offered this workshop and I decided to attend, along with a comfortable-sized group of other aspiring guitarists.

Pat had decided that, in the interests of preserving the remainder of the world's forests, this workshop would be paperless. He kindly emailed his teaching notes not only to attendees, but to anybody we had contacted in promoting the workshop.



Pat introduced us to four alternative tunings and I was amazed by his knowledge. Rather than give us a series of chords, for each tuning he explained what kinds of music each could be used for and gave us some very sound advice on ways that we could explore the tunings for ourselves.

I came away thoroughly inspired to have a go, build up my own knowledge and play tunes for a start, using at least one tuning. I am sure we all felt similarly. Pat was humble and dedicated to helping each of us explore this strange world. His knowledge, willingness and ability to assist everyone was wonderful.

Thank you so much, Pat. You are a wonderful, generous and dedicated musician guitarist, teacher and person. This was one of the best interactive workshops I have every attended - an inspiration.

9. Review, VicFolk at Acoustic Routes, 26 July

What a great night we had!

Acoustic Routes had invited the Victoria University Folk Club to do the July concert, with a free rein to fill the bill in whatever way it chose. What the VicFolk folks gave us was a showcase of their music and talents that demonstrated why they have become a refreshing new force on the local Celtic music scene.



VicFolk emerged only last year, drawing its members from both staff and students at the university. Fiddler James McNamara, one of its creators, brought to the club his experience of leading the Cambridge University ceilidh band during his time studying there. Its first outing was a St Patrick's Day ceilidh in the Aro Valley Community Centre and since then it's barely paused

to draw breath, hosting regular dances as well as music sessions.

And VicFolk gave the audience at this concert little chance to draw breath either, with a full-on programme of tunes and songs that had us beating the feet and reeling and jigging in our seats.

There were eight performers in the line-up, which featured fiddles, pipes, accordion and recorder, as well as singers. The full band began and finished each half of the programme, pumping out the energy with sets of reels, jigs, polkas and hornpipes. In between, we were entertained by combinations of duets and solos that mixed and matched the multiple talents on display.

So, we heard piper, Kris Nielsen swap the uilleann pipes for the Scottish small pipes in a solo set that started with a slow air. Kris, on small pipes and low whistle, teamed up with fiddler Emily Griffiths for two sets. Emily, a very busy bee that night, also joined forces with accordionist Jonathan Berkahn, for a couple of items, and with James McNamara for a sizzling set of polkas. James also joined fellow fiddler Gillian Gillies for a set of reels and did a solo piece as well. He teamed up with the hard-working Jonathan on another couple of sets, including some Scandinavian polkas composed by Jonathan.

And, the cream on the cake - the songs. Cynthia Wratt gave us "Red Is The Rose", Emily sang "She Moved Through The Fair" and Francesca Moore, "The Skye Boat Song", all sung with real feeling and backed by Jonathan, the grand master of accompaniment. Then Emily topped it all with an absolutely belting version of "Byker Hill".

The band pulled out "Star of the County Down" as an encore and a final set of jigs to send us home bouncing.


