1. AR monthly concert featuring Charlotte Yates with Liz and Tim and the Godwits, Roseneath School Hall, 28 July, 7:30 pm

Charlotte Yates is a professional independent New Zealand singer-songwriter with a growing catalogue of 22 solo and collaborative releases.

She runs **Songwriting School**, an online songwriting tuition subscription and a songwriting coaching service, **Songdoctor**. Charlotte also works with international clients as author/mentor for US/UK music educational websites **Soundfly, Musician on a Mission and Bandzoogle**.

No stranger to the format of pairing famous words with music, Charlotte has devoted albums to James K Baxter, Hone Tuwhare, Witi Ihimaera and Katherine Mansfield.

Her latest solo release, *Chime*, is a track from Marc Chesterman's Woodhead Reimagined album and currently rotation @ bFM. She's looking forward to performing on 28 July solo and unplugged, which is exactly how she started.

Liz and Tim are somewhat reclusive treasures in the Wellington folk and acoustic music scene. They specialise in playing Maqam - the music system used since the time of the Babylonians – on violin and oud. But then they might play guitar, ukelele clarinet or even banjo. And the music might be medieval, swing or early jazz, Tinpan Alley, Celtic tunes, New Zealand songs, rock, blues, or original tunes and songs. Whatever they choose, this will be a musical delight from two fabulous musicians.



The Godwits



Vic has been writing songs and playing in bands, most of his life and has performed at festivals throughout Australia and in the U.S. Lis was given a guitar by her son a few years back and started writing songs and playing with friends. Lis met Vic when she heard him performing his originals at Thorndon market, Wellington. Vic and Lis started

playing music together as The Godwits, with Gael joining them on bass. Other musicians join the flock from time to time. The Godwits play laid-back sad songs, mostly originals, while also having fun. They will soon be releasing their new EP.

4. The 2022 Joan Prior Young Performers Award



A heads up for young singers and musicians aged 18 to 25 years on September 30 and from the Greater Wellington Region (the area covered by Wellington Regional Council and Kapiti and Horowhenua Districts). Acoustic Routes will be running its Joan Prior Award again this year, with added benefits.

The format is the same as last year, so up to seven applicants will be offered full weekend passes to Wellington Folk Festival at

Labour Weekend in October, where they will feature in a Young Performers concert. As well, discussions are underway for some extra performance opportunities that we will be offering after WellyFest.

The award is open to singers and instrumentalists, and to performers of traditional as well as contemporary and original material. Applicants can be a solo performer, or a duo or trio. Check next month's Balladeer and the Acoustic Routes website for more details.

5. Review, Whimzik concert with Steampunk Minstrels and Pick & Mixolydian, 23 June

If ever you wanted proof of the diversity of the local folk and acoustic music scene, Acoustic Routes' June concert in the lovely wee Roseneath school hall fits the bill. In the space of a couple of hours we were taken on a musical and theatrical world trip that included Scotland and Ireland, Scandinavia, the United States, South Africa, and of course New Zealand. Along the way we got to sample traditional and contemporary songs and tunes, some highly individual original compositions and a stage show.

Opening the concert were **Pick and Mixolydian**, Wellington duo Jo Shrigley and Bruce Omundsen. Jo sings and plays ukulele, with Bruce on whistles, Scottish small pipes and vocals. It's not your usual instrumental combination and it brought a freshness to those old Irish standards, "The Sally Gardens" and "Star of the Country Down" (that one enhanced with some additional Kiwi verses on the end). They also did a lovely version of "Six Ribbons" the theme from a TV series of the same name. And, because the concert was the day before our first ever Matariki public holiday, they introduced us to a special song to celebrate the seven stars, "He Waiata Matariki. As a treat for a young piper in the audience, Bruce finished with a couple of Scottish tunes on his Hamish Moore small pipes.

Steampunk Minstrels who rounded off the first half of the evening, play original music on a combination of 12 and 6-string guitars, mandolin and electric bass. Mairi-Anne and Marius were part of the folk scheme in South Africa before moving to New Zealand. They describe their music as a fusion of African and Celtic with a hint of rock and jazz. You can certainly hear all those influences but there are other elements as well, including the intricate and sometimes complex arrangements which give their songs and instrumentals a dynamic quality. For instance, their instrumental about a family journey that features Mairi-Ann's finger-picked mandolin. Or another instrumental inspired by a visit to Kaikoura where the bass voices the sounds of the whales and hidden in the melody is a subtle echo of the Wellerman song.

Topping off our magical journey **Whimzik** - Glenn Kastrinos and Kjelsty Hanson, from Hawkes Bay, out of America, who blended music and theatre in their unique and delightfully whimsical performance. Kjelsty has used her artistry as a sculptor to create masks of fantastical creatures and characters that she combines with long flowing robes to dance and prance about the stage and amongst the audience, accompanied by Glenn on wood flute, guitar and mandola. The big red bird danced to a Swedish tune and the giraffe paraded to an African theme, nudging off Glenn's cap in the process.



As well, Glenn sang songs from Dougie MacLean, Bill Staines ("The River") and two from John Prine, with Kjelsty appearing as an old woman to illustrate "Angel from Montgomery". When not in character, Kjelsty emerged as herself to accompany tunes on bodhran and other percussion.

It was truly a night of delight.
