1. AR monthly concert featuring South for Winter, with Luca Joass and Beans, Roseneath School Hall, Thursday 23 February, 7:30 pm



With a blend of dreamy acoustic duets, bluesy murder ballads and foot-stomping folk, Nashville-based **South for Winter** are Kiwi Nick Stone and his Colorado-born wife Dani Cichon.

These two songwriters and multi-instrumentalists combine elements including acoustic guitar, mandolin, electric guitar, and suitcase stomp into a genre-bending sound described by American Songwriter as "laden with delicate harmonies, intricate guitar-work and earthy vocals ... impeccable sound".

Their 2021 debut album *Luxumbra*, with GRAMMY-award winning producer Matt Leigh, has received international accolades.

Christchurch-based singer song-writer **Luca Joass** grew up travelling around the NZ folk scene with his parents, core members of the Wellington celtic-folk band Hobnail. You won't find him much happier than with a guitar in his hands and a song in his heart. Taking inspiration from his folk background, and bringing it an alternative, modern, twist, Luca's songs are rife with catchy melodies and a whole lot of heart.





Inspired by the folk traditions of their native Yorkshire, singer songwriter and multi-instrumentalist **Beans** blends gentle indie folk sounds with a unique lyrical style. Their original songs are rich with humour, honesty and carefully crafted word play, borne of a love of language combined with a vibrant imagination and inner world. A newcomer to the Wellington scene, previously performing on and around the Sunshine Coast, Queensland, Australia, playing to a dedicated local fan base in small venues and festivals.



5. Auckland 50th Anniversary Folk Festival



We had nearly finished setting up camp on Friday when the rain arrived. It was the beginning of a very special festival which I know will always stay vivid in my mind.

What to do next? The water is rising everywhere, and a river is forming below us, running behind the sheds and the barn. Friends are leaving. What will the Festival Committee decide to do? Auckland goes into a state of emergency. The request is made to avoid non-essential travel. I decide to stay put.

What followed was an inspiring celebration of our folkie community and of the power of live music and dance to raise the human spirit, even in the face of uncertainty for all and potentially catastrophe awaiting some who could not get back to their homes because of local flooding.

I cannot praise the Festival Committee enough for how they handled the situation. They made carefully reasoned decisions and communicated them brilliantly. They worked incredibly hard, and the result was an extraordinary credit to them. With all the marquees out of action, the revised programme was shifted to the halls, the sheds, and the barn. This was a truly memorable festival not only for the great performances and events we enjoyed together, but also for the caring and companionship we shared. Emerging back into the big challenges facing the wider world reinforced for me how precious this time was.

There are also major challenges ahead for the Auckland Festival as the financial and other consequences of the deluges become more apparent. I would encourage you to offer whatever support you can to the Festival Committee as they work through this. I am definitely planning to be at the 51st Auckland Folk Festival.

Up Close & Personal Plimmerton presents Scott Cook, 21 Gordon Road Plimmerton, Tuesday 21 February, 7:30 pm

We are very excited to be hosting Scott.

In 2007, Albertan songwriter Scott Cook quit his job teaching kindergarten in Taiwan and moved into a minivan. He's made his living as a troubadour ever since, touring almost incessantly across Canada, the US, Europe, Asia, Australia, New Zealand and elsewhere, averaging 150 shows and a dozen summer festivals a year, and releasing seven albums of plainspoken, keenly observant verse along the way.



His latest collection *Tangle of Souls* comes packaged in a cloth-bound, 240-page hardcover book of road stories and ruminations, equal parts introspection and insurrection. The album spent two weeks at #1 on Alberta's province-wide community radio network CKUA, and earned Scott his third Canadian Folk Music Award nomination, for English Songwriter of the Year. Its second single "Say Can You See" was the second most-played song of 2020 on Folk Alliance International's folk radio charts and took top honours for the folk category in both the 2020 UK Songwriting Competition and the 2020 Great American Song Contest.

He is returning to Australia and Aotearoa for the first time since the pandemic, believing more than ever that songs can change your life, and your life can change the world.
