1. AR monthly concert featuring Rob Joass, Toil & Trouble, and Sean & Rosie O'Connor, Roseneath School Hall, Thursday 22 June, 7:30 pm



Singer songwriter **Rob Joass** moved to New Zealand from his native Sydney over 30 years ago and has toured and released 10 albums with his bands Hobnail, Too Many Chiefs and The Shot Band, as well as 3 solo albums (currently working on a 4th). He has been a finalist at the NZ Music Awards three times (twice for best country song, once for best folk album) and has had songs covered by artists in New Zealand, Australia and Canada.

Toil and Trouble are a Wellington based trio comprising Jude Douglas (fiddle and vocals), Mary Hubble (flute and vocals) and Ron Craig (guitar and vocals). They play traditional and contemporary songs and tunes mainly with an English/Celtic flavour. Also included are a few American, Canadian, and antipodean numbers. The group are all long-time members of the Wellington folk scene.





Sean and Rosie O'Connor. Sean and his wife Amanda became a feature of the Kiwi folk scene in the nineties with their diverse folk pop Celtic originals, beautiful harmonies and fine guitar and flute playing. The late 2000s saw them on tour as a family band in NZ and overseas, until Amanda's sudden death in 2011.

In the last few years Sean has completed a solo album including songs written during the O'Connors' earlier years,

their family tours, in response to Amanda's death and beyond. Rosie, his daughter, has a beautiful voice and a great ear for harmony. Expect great songs with heart and harmony.

5. Truly an Aotearoa/New Zealand night for NZ Music Month; review by Janette Munneke

L.A.B. are touring in the States right now, and maybe they're even thinking "I wanna come home", but we had them right here in spirit, covered by our first act on Thursday - **Hot Tubs**. Hot Tubs went on to apply their nice round warm treatment to Ruru Karaitiana's song *Blue Smoke*, written on board a troop ship in 1940, and selling 10,000 copies in 1952. They followed that up with *Tahi Nei Taru Kino* by Paraire Tomoana (famous for writing *Pokarekare Ana*), at the time of the first world war. Hot Tubs is headed by Lynn Clark, and we weren't going to let them away without a rendition of *Send the boats away*, written by Lynn in the 1980s. About the ships

carrying plutonium (nuclear waste) through Pacific waters, that song was a kind of anthem for me back then, and it was great to sing along to the chorus (surprised at how many lyrics I remembered!), and to sing along to their closing number *The Lonely Blues Song* by Slim Dusty and Joy McKean.

Kevin Ikin and Susan Ellis were up next, also starting with a Māori flavour, with Kevin's moving song *Parihaka*. All of Kevin's set was self-penned, great to hear some I hadn't heard before, from the song about Bert and his West Coast air service from Hokitika to the Haast, to the train line from Napier to Gisborne – "I hear that train a-coming", or do I? Kevin finished the set with his song *The bank is not your friend* - love the lyric about the money being 'locked in the profit mine'.

Don Franks started his set with a trio of numbers by NZ greats. First, a lovely rendition of *Nga Iwi E* by Hirini Melbourne, a great song to sing along with. The poem *Down on my Luck* by ARD Fairburn set to music was followed by a ukulele instrumental, *White rabbit*, by NZ guitar legend Peter Posa. Then came a trio of Don's own philosophical greats, *The Aro Street route*, which referenced one of the regulars at our Holland street Friday night sessions, country music guitarist Bob McGuigan, a.k.a. Bob the bus driver, then a cautionary tale about horseshit being "just like money, no good in one big pile" (you've got to spread it out evenly before it can do some good), and finally, a song about a lost jandal – "without a foot to walk in it, it can't have gone too far".

Sage, Murray Kilpatrick (on the other side of the microphone this time) and Sue Rose, ably assisted by Susan Ellis on cello and fiddle, finished off the night in fine style. Starting with the "Gumdigger's Lament", an anonymous poem collected by E. L. Eyre and put to music by Neil Colquhoun about the grim life of some early NZers, they soon came a little closer to home with a song about Pauatahanui, jointly penned by Sue and Murray about a location close to their hearts. The rollicking *Wellington croc bike rag* followed – a true flight of fancy around the Wellington waterfront and beyond. And what a beautiful and fitting way to end the night – the soulful and lulling *Hine e hine*, written by Fanny Howie (also known by her stage name Princess Te Rangi Pai) in around 1907 and known to many of us as the "Goodnight Kiwi" song, performed with a great blend of lovely voices.

While doing some research for this review, I came across another lovely tribute to NZ music, Gone but not forgotten, a slideshow with music by Martha Louise, prepared for the Auckland Folk Festival January 2023 remembering Folk Legends and friends who are no longer with us.
