# 1. AR monthly concert featuring Bob Cooper Grundy & Kate Marshall, Rachel Hird, and Glenn Barclay, Roseneath School Hall, Thursday 27 July, 7:30 pm



Bob Cooper-Grundy has been playing blues guitar and singing country songs for 50 odd years and has opened for Guy Clark, Townes van Zandt, Tom Russell and Jimmy Lafave. He plays finger picking and slide guitar with some virtuoso flourishes.

Kate Marshall plays violin, accordion and flute and sings beautifully. She started with classical piano and singing in choirs and you don't have to listen that carefully to hear Bach and Mozart lurking behind Bob Wills and

Memphis Minnie. In this gig she might add in her new secret weapon of jazz glockenspiel!

Based in the Wairarapa, and regular guests at folk clubs and festivals, Bob and Kate's song list veers between swing sounds of Texas, the blues and jazz, served up in the Bob and Kate way.

**Rachel Hird** is a Wellington based singer-songwriter who has studied music and played piano for many years. She started writing songs a few years ago with jazz singer Lucy Smyth and is currently a member of Charlotte Yate's Songwriting School. A regular attendee at Newtown Acoustic Sound open mic, she enjoys meeting and connecting with people in the music community. Her songs are inspired by people and situations past and present.





**Glenn Barclay** originally hailed from Auckland, where he had some involvement in the folk scene in the 1970s, but now lives in Porirua, after 40 years in Wellington. He has been playing for many years, sometimes in bands that would average a gig a year, but mainly for relaxation. After a bit of a break, he has begun playing solo, featuring tunes from the broad Americana songbook, including one or two of his own, and is looking forward to the concert.

## 5. Review, AR June concert with Rob Joass, Don & the Divorcees, and Sean & Rosie O'Connor

Another great concert with self-penned material. We found out shortly before the date that Ron was unfortunately unwell, so we couldn't have Toil & Trouble as planned, but **Don & the Divorcees** stepped in and gave us a lovely start to the show. It seemed a set of two halves in terms of syllables – with Holly's first song, *Seventeen*, being mesmerizingly mono-syllabic, and Beans concluding with their song called *Biological Reasons*, which made a lovely rhythm out of multi-syllabic words! In between, there was Don's song, *Time is running out*, Holly's *Bubble* and Beans' *Ashdown*. I've heard the latter before and still found it charmingly engaging, influenced no doubt by the

magical surrounding it references, because Ashdown Forest is the real-life Hundred Acre Wood of Winnie-the-Pooh fame.

**Sean and Rosie** haven't been performing as a duo together for long, but you can certainly sense the long-term family and father-daughter bond when listening to them. They started with a song called *Us and Them*, and then braved *Simple Things* written 20 years ago for Sean's wife, singer Amanda O'Connor. Another song was *Pōtiki*, which I for one would like to hear again. They finished off with *Young Wild Rovers*, which Sean wrote about his times playing in Irish pubs to a background of the sports on a large-screen TV.

**Rob Joass's** first song was inspired by a gay guy who grew up in a mining town in Australia, starting with an instrumental about going on a journey, called *On a Westbound Train*. It was nice to get the background story. The first four numbers were about journeys of different sorts, the second being *Baggage*, then *The Last Rodeo*, and the lovely song *Truck Driver* (from the album *Pencarrow*), a love song about being stuck behind a slow truck driver when going to town to buy a ring. I like *Johnny and June* – "I could be your Johnny, won't you be my June" for its reference to two of the greats of country music, and *Holding the Sky* (I think that was the title) for its social commentary about some of the issues society faces today, including racism and mass shootings by kids at high schools. After a song about getting older and "missing the old me", Rob invited Sean and Rosie up again to perform his new love song *Jigsaw Heart* ("your jigsaw heart looks good to me"). Despite being "one of the hardest working musicians in the business" with coming up to 30 years performing, Rob made it a fresh, intimate and collegial performance, bringing the evening to a close with *Goodnight*, with Sean, Rosie, and Beans (on fiddle) joining in.

Beans is off overseas for a few months, so we won't hear Don & the Divorcees again for a while, but we've booked Toil & Trouble for our September concert – something to put in the diary!

A heads up for young singers and musicians aged 18 to 25 years on September 30



and from the Greater Wellington Region (the area covered by Wellington Regional Council and Kapiti and Horowhenua Districts). Acoustic Routes will be running its Joan Prior Award again this year, with added benefits.

The format is the same as last year, so up to seven applicants will be offered full weekend passes to Wellington Folk Festival at Labour Weekend in October, where they will feature in a Young Performers concert. As well, awardees will be able to perform at a special concert at the Moon Bar, Newtown, organized by Don Mackay in early November.

The award is open to singers and instrumentalists, and to performers of traditional as well as contemporary and original material. Applicants can be a solo performer, or a duo or trio. Check next month's Balladeer and the Acoustic Routes website for more details.

Expect an eclectic range of styles, including some of Mary's originals. Love in its many forms is a common theme


throughout the show. It is, after all, what make the world go around. So be prepared to shed tears of laughter or sadness... and everything in between!
