AR monthly concert featuring The Jimmies – the final fling, with Divine Pitch and Simple Gifts, Roseneath School Hall, Roseneath School Hall, Thursday 24 August, 7:30 pm



The Jimmies, Wellington's longest running folk band, have decided to call it a day after more than 35 years of music making. Their appearance at Acoustic Routes' August concert will be their swan song.

The band began life in 1986 as the Jimmy Cook Band - a ceilidh and barn-dance band, and their distinctive brand of mainly Irish and Scottish music broadened over the years to include Kiwi songs and standards from the sixties and seventies, as well as original songs and tunes. Besides their dance, birthday and wedding gigs, they have been regulars at Wellyfest and have kicked up a song and dance at festivals and other events throughout the North Island.

The first line-up back in 1986 was Mary Hubble, Kevin Ikin, Liz Merton, Ken Allan, Colin Morrison and (briefly) Bruce Chapman. Other Jimmies over the years have included Malcolm Alder (bass) Bob Silbery (bass), David Knowles (electric guitar), and Ruairidh Morrison (fiddle, flute, whistles and concertina). Musical mates who have helped out when they have been short of a player have included Tim Barrie and Duncan Davidson, as well as whanau.

This final concert features Mary Hubble, Kevin Ikin, Ann McChesney, Murray Kilpatrick, Susan Ellis and Kevin McLoughlin. Together they'll be on flute, whistles, tenor banjo, guitar, mandolin, percussion, keyboard, accordion, banjo, fiddle, bass, and of course vocals, reviving some of their earlier repertoire as well as more recent favourites.

Divine Pitch (Stephen Riddell and Megan Ward) are a folk duo who tell stories from the mouth of the fish: Te Upoko o te Ika / Wellington. The "divine pitch" is what they call A = 432 Hz tuning, a slightly flatter pitch with a certain resonance that helps humans feel connected to one another and to a spiritual reality. Stephen and Megan play from a foundation of Irish



tunes and old-world ballads, and also write their own songs about local content. Stephen plays guitar and occasionally piano, while Megan plays fiddle, mandolin, and banjo, also occasionally tin whistle or cello.

5. Review, July concert with Bob Cooper Grundy & Kate Marshall, Rachel Hird, and Glenn Barclay

There was quite a family theme to the concert this month. Wellington based singer-songwriter **Rachel Hird** opened the night for us with a beautiful set of self-penned songs inspired by family members. The first was *Take Me Back to Karamea*, inspired by her grandfather's letters written when he served in the Great War. This was followed by *Wintersweet* and a lovely song written for her sister Erin. Another song about Karamea followed, this one about Umere on the Karamea River, somewhere I'd never heard of, but I could hear the sound of water rippling over 'vagabond stones' in the keyboard backing. Finally, a song for Rachel's mother – "I hear you laughing through the page" – about reading her mother's diaries.

Glenn Barclay originally hailed from Auckland, and now lives in Porirua. After many years playing in bands, he's now going solo, and we were treated to a mix of covers and self-penned material. A John Hiatt set to start with, with *Robber's Highway*, *Aces up Your Sleeve*, and *All the Way to the River*. One of the great things about the variety of people we have performing at the Acoustic Routes is getting introduced to new music you might otherwise have missed. Glenn's next number, the mesmerising *Land of Plenty*, was one of these, by Abigail Lapell, and I look forward to hearing more by her. It was good also to hear Glenn's own song *The Great Escape*.

Bob Cooper-Grundy and Kate Marshall are a duo based in the Wairarapa. Their first number, *Moonlight Blues*, with Bob on guitar and Kate on accordian and vocals, took me into another world and I felt as if it was "just me and the nighttime" for a few moments there! The next song *Levelland* by James McMurtry was definitely another world – the tabletop flat lands of the southwest of America – and another songwriter to follow up.It was back to New Zealand for Jenny Mitchell's *One Day* next, and one of Bob's own songs, *Bless Their Little Hillbilly Hearts*. I love the sense of humour in that and Bob's *Positive Drinking* song.

Kate's song 1940s Man painted a parallel world too, but it's the portrait of her exmother-in-law Nansie that has stayed with me, with the lines about how she "bore the brunt of it, put a front on it"- as did so many women, particularly of that generation. Those 'standards' like *Embraceable You, Brownsville Blues* and *Statesboro Blues* were a welcome reminder for me of how much I love 'them blues' and made a good foil for Bob's and Kate's own songs, but the latter were the highlight for me, expertly performed by very talented musicians. Kate said on her way out that she'd really enjoyed performing to a listening audience. That's us, folks! I'll listen to that anytime.

6. Calling Young Performers: the 2023 Joan Prior Young Performers Award



Entries are now open for the 2023 Joan Prior Young Performers Award, which Acoustic Routes (The Wellington Folk Centre) is running again this year to support young performers aged from 18 to 25 years.

The award will follow the same format as last year. Up to seven applicants (depending on the number of performers in each act) will be offered full weekend passes to Wellington Folk Festival. They will feature in a Young Performers concert at Wellyfest.

As an added attraction, following the Festival, the JPA winners will appear in a special Young Performers Showcase at the Moon Bar in Newtown, on Sunday, November 5. It will be hosted by Don Mackay, who runs the popular Songwriter concerts there.

The award is open to singers and instrumentalists, and to performers of traditional as well as contemporary and original material, living in the wider Wellington region. Applicants can be a solo performer, or a duo or trio.

All genres of music are acceptable. As a general guide, this includes the wide variety of mainly acoustic music performed at folk festivals.
