#### Whare Flat Folk Festival, 30 December 2023 to 3 January 2024

Waiora Camp, Whare Flat, Dunedin

Billed as being the best way to bring in the New Year, the festival's headline acts include Fiddlesticks, Sadie & Jay, Mishra and Thompson Springs. Featuring world class musicians from New Zealand and around the world, Dunedin Folk Club's Whare Flat Folk Festival is four days of music, sun, camping, workshops and jams in the idyllic native bush surrounds of Waiora Scout Camp (15 minutes' drive from Dunedin).

#### Auckland Folk Festival, 26-29 January 2024

Kumeu Showgrounds, Kumeu, Auckland



Now into its fifth decade, the Auckland Folk festival is a venerable institution, first conceived and created by the folk and traditional music and dance clubs of Auckland in the 1970's. For the past 30 years, the festival has been based at the Kumeu Showgrounds in West Auckland, where the music venues are spread over gently rolling paddocks and campers meet up with old friends and musical comrades-at-arms to play and dance long into the night.

Despite the wash-out of the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Festival in January 2023, the brave festival organisers have decided that Festival 2024 will go ahead! # 5. Review of the AR October concert showcasing local treasures, reviewed by Janette Munneke

**Robyn Lynn Webber's** first time performing at an Acoustic Routes main concert included three self-penned numbers: A New Version of Me, about getting a recharge on an island holiday; a song about Nana who secretly left a child behind in Scotland (lovely lyric – "you kept it in Pandora's box"); and the third a love song, Still in Love With You. Taken from her real-life experiences, Robyn Lynn's songs are of travelling and going through a breakup, amongst other things that we come up against in our daily lives. You can buy her album on Bandcamp.

Margaret Pullar was the winner of the Acoustic Routes Most Improved Performer Award (formerly the JA Pan trophy) at the AGM this year, and well-deserved it was, too. This was also her first time performing at an AR main concert. Margaret's choice of songs reflected her journey to "the big stage", starting with Union Maid, by Woody Guthrie, a song she learned at Lynn Blann's ukulele group, followed by a COVID song (with a positive ending). Margaret followed that with an upbeat Titanic song, and finished off with a number by one of her favourite songwriters, the beautiful Home to

Me (is anywhere you are) by Tom Paxton. For John, of course!

The first half was finished off with the return of **Helen Dorothy** who has been in the UK for some months. Helen sang a poem by Michael O'Leary that she had put to music, From P.H.D. to PhD, and one of her own called Far From the Light, about the captured colossal squid now still-life at Te Papa, sadly no longer roaming at large in the ocean. Then she set us a test to identify the subject of her newest song, a beautiful number called Sleepy Transformation – the clue was in the title. In typical Helen style, it was lyrical, melodic, and thought-provoking, with a lovely guitar accompaniment. I'm looking forward to the next album.

**Tony Ricketts and Jenny Kilpatrick** kicked off the second half singing songs by Dick Coker. Dick was a very versatile and prolific songwriter who lived variously in Auckland and Wellington, and was known particularly for his humorous songs, as Tony and Jenny illustrated with aplomb, starting with The Bloody Hell Song, followed by a protest song, Parlez-vous Anglais, the Pimple Song and the Streaker Song, and finishing with First-hand Experience.

**West Road**, that is, **Ron Craig** on guitar and vocals, **Andrea Coop** on vocals and fiddle, and **Christine Roseveare** on vocals and bass, rounded off the night. They sang 1962 by Ron Hynes ("That's all gone, won't come back again..."), Keep Your Distance by Richard Thompson, and the lovely bluegrass number, Don't This Road Look Rough and Rocky, written by Charles Justice and Japanese-American fiddle player Shoji Tabuchi, who died in August this year (according to the interweb). They continued the nostalgia theme with the Joan Baez song, Diamonds and Rust, and a beautiful combination of a John Beavis's song The Maritime, and The Water is Wide. Their encore was an upbeat number, Paul Brady's song Rainbow.

It really was a club concert with lots of members on the stage, and others pitching in to help with setting up the sound gear as we couldn't get into the venue as early as we'd have liked – hats off to Murray who managed the set-up and sound checks in record time!

Speaking of the venue, it was our first time running a concert in the Johnsonville Collective Community Hub (where we have our regular third-Monday-night sing around) and people I spoke to seemed to find it a good venue and location. If you were there and have any feedback about it, we'd love to hear it! Please let your Committee know by emailing any of the email addresses in the contact section of the Balladeer. We agreed at the AGM in August that we'd try out suitable venues if we found them – always on the lookout for options to make our music more accessible to more people – and it would great to have your opinion.
