Mary has been part of our local folk scene since she arrived in Wellington 50 years ago,



with forays into classical guitar and various choirs. She has sung with many people...in the early days it was with Dave Nicholson & Mary Hubble. Later, she linked up with Sarah Duckworth & then Robin Brew, the Magpies (acapella 4 part), and Dr Livingston and the Presumptions (band with Don and Jill). Her current singing partner is Sue Chamberlain although Mary and Robin are dusting off their voci for an airing in early 2026! Mary loves to harmonise, and aims to not just come up with something that sounds nice, but that actually tries to enhance the sound of the singer with the tune, - a

technique learned from her barbershop-Sweet Adeline sojourn. Today however we are going to hear Mary as a soloist. She will share a range of songs that she likes to sing on her own, and puts the harmony in with her guitar work. Some will be her own songs, and the rest is likely to focus on her take on some Celtic favourites using a DADGAD tuning on her guitar. Some of the songs will be familiar to you, but others less so. She is pretty excited about doing this, as it is rare for her to sing alone. In the second half, we'll go around the circle and you're welcome to lead a song or tune. All welcome; bring instruments and voices. \$5 charge to go to the musician.

# 6. Review of the AR November concert with The Madillionaires, with support acts Hunter Giltrap, and The Short(er) Blacks

Our last concert for the year was a lovely note to go out on. **The Short(er) Blacks** opened for us with Julian Ward singing a song for the first time on stage, called Nancy. A bunch of 'classic' Irish songs ('Nancy Spain', 'I love the ground she walked upon' and 'The Boys of Kildare') followed, with great vocals by Roy and beautiful guitar by Julian. Making a glorious comeback after over a year of health issues for both, these guys continue to push the boundaries, with Roy arriving in the driver's seat of the car for the first time in far too long, and Julian on vocals for the first time ever!



**Hunter Giltrap** continued in a traditional vein, starting with a gospel tune, followed by 'Let no man steal away your thyme', 'The fitter's song' by Ewan MacColl, 'The rigs of time', and concluding with 'The blackest crow'. Lovely renditions and it was terrific to hear Hunter performing solo, with backing and harmonies from the audience chorus, which included a significant number of Pōneke Shanty Club members in full voice.

The main act for the night was talented multi-generational family trio, **The Madillionaires**; Peter, Jude and Joseph, with a mix of originals and singalong covers, including songs by Richie Stearns, Bruce Springsteen ('Tougher than the rest'), Gus van Sant, Bob Wills ('San Antonio Rose'), and Brennen Leigh of McKay and Leigh ('The only other person in the room'). The latter featured a great solo from Joseph Coleman, as did many of the others.



Originals included 'Cowboy needs the blue', and 'Daylight Robbery', both songs that were born out of Jude Madill's happy obsession with cowboy life and the Sundance Kid in particular. All backed by the superb playing on superb instruments by Peter Madill.

The set concluded with a lively rendition of 'Got to get back home', with sometime band member Jenny Kilpatrick joining the line-up.

A nice way to wrap up what has been a year of quality well-attended concerts involving a mix of performers from out of town and the Wellington region. We look forward to more next year!

### Ballads to Blues and ANZFA Folk Music Awards, Saturday 3 January, Hanover Hall, Dunedin

Stay in town after the Whare Flat Folk Festival for the night of the 3rd of January for the Ballads to Blues Concert at the Hanover Hall in Dunedin - the premier showcase of NZ folk music and the second ANZFA Folk Music Awards Ceremony. Featuring RD1 (Nelson), Chris Penman (Hamilton) and Lara Rose (Dunedin) and resident house band The Dunedin Ceilidh Orchestra.

Twelve kiwi artists entered twelve great albums, and the members have spoken. The six ANZFA Folk Music Award finalists are: **Ari Leason** for *Hello Darling*, **BB Bowness** for *Goodtime Revival*, **Butter Wouldn't Melt** for *Where the Roots Grow Deep*, **Jean Reid** for *And Aye She Sings*, **Sammy Leary** for *Old Bush Road and* **The Wooden Box Band** for *Broken River* — they are vying for any of five possible awards, **Best Traditional**, **Best Kiwiana**, **Best Original**, **Best Americana** and the overall member's choice: **Best Folk Album 2025**. #### 8. Some sad losses in the folk community here and beyond

#### Costa Botes 1958-2025 - Obituary by Carol Bean

Award winning film maker and musician, Costa Botes (bo-tess) passed away in Mary Potter Hospice a few days ago from a ten-year battle with the demon cancer.



He continued playing music and making films right through to the end. In fact, just a few days before he died, his brother Achilles and I iammed a few tunes with him so he could play the Les Paul

Gold Top Gibson he'd just bought.

It was his dream guitar. We played the Allman Brothers "Midnight Rider" for a good 20 minutes while Costa created tasty lead breaks and Achilles wove beautiful mandolin lines throughout the whole, and I sang the infamous lines, 'and I'm not going to let them get me, no....'. It made Costa smile to be in his 'happy place'.

Costa gained worldwide recognition with the mockumentary 'Forgotten Silver', created with Peter Jackson. After a thirty-year gap, the film was recently screened at the Embassy Theatre as part of the International Film Festival. The theatre was full of the film's admirers, laughing at parts, gasping, cheering, commenting out loud... 'oh there's me!', and at the end, a standing ovation that lasted until Costa slowly walked out of the theatre — a lone figure with his pork pie hat and cane. I cried.

Costa's film credits include 'Stalin's Sickle', 'Saving Grace', 'Lost in Wonderland', 'The Last Dogs of Winter', 'Angie', and 'When the Cows Came Home'. "His work blended craft with compassion, and his influence can be felt in the many filmmakers he guided

and inspired as a teacher at the film school." NZ On Screen. https://www.nzonscreen.com/profile/costa-botes

Costa and I have worked together for well over twenty years. I learned a great deal about filmmaking and editing from him and crewed on several of his projects as a camera operator. Musical instruments lined his studio wall, and I'd take them down one at a time and play while he edited. Then we started playing music together. On the main stage of the Wellington Folk Festival, Costa was the banjo player in my *Mount Misery String Band*. For the next decade, he played a series of guitars in whichever combination of musicians were in my bands. We had a band saying...."does it lift off the ground? If so, then yes. Let's play."


With George Packard on bass and Andrew Grayson on drums, Costa and I had some memorable last few gigs, which Barry Carter filmed. Barry and I will be collating some of that footage and making sure that Costa's best musical moments will be remembered.

#### The Final Trawl - Archie Fisher 1939-2025 by Sue Ikin

For those of you who may not be aware, Archie Fisher died on Saturday 1 November of lung cancer. Archie was a leading figure in the Scottish folk revival form the early 1960s until the present decade. A performer until the last year of his life, he finally retired with a gig at Ardersier Folk Club in late October 2024.

As well as performing and recording with his sisters Ray and Cilla, Archie developed a solo career of his own. At first he covered traditional material but went on to develop



as a song writer in his own right. His best known songs included The Final Trawl, Men of Worth, the epic ballad-style The Witch of the West-Mer-Lands and The Shipyard Apprentice, also known as The Fairfield Crane, written with Buchan and Bobby Campbell. Dark-Eyed Molly was covered by Fairport Convention and Eva Cassidy.

From 1983 to 2010 Archie presented BBC Scotland's Travelling Folk programme, which was a must listen even on this side of the world. Archie toured extensively in the USA and Canada where he formed an enduring musical

partnership with Garnet Rogers (the late Stan Rogers' brother).

In 1991 Archie toured NZ and we were fortunate to have him as a guest at the 1991 Wellington Folk Festival. Farewell Archie, and thanks for the music and the memories over all the years.

#### Collette Rivers/Nickelsen 1979-2025 - Obituary by Don MacKay

It is with great sadness that we report the passing of Colette Nickelsen (aka Colette Rivers) after a brave fight with cancer.

Colette was born in Washington State, and came to New Zealand at age 11. She grew up in Taupo where she began to develop a name for herself in the local music and drama scenes, then became visible to the Wellington music scene after moving south to the Wairarapa in



2016.



Monday to Friday Colette was head of the Drama Department at Rathkeale College in Masterton. In the evenings and weekends she wrote, produced and performed some of the best original music to come out of the region in recent years. She leaves a musical legacy of two great albums Memory Lake (2021) and The Backyard Wonder (2025) and an EP Wandering Thoughts (2019).

We remember Colette as a strong positive and energetic human who kept pushing forwards even in the face of adversity. Colette's final performance was on the Balladeer stage at Wellyfest 2025. Acoustic Routes sends condolences to Colette's husband Alexandre.
